In order to grow healthy plants, it is important to prepare the soil first. Good soil is moderately compact, has good drainage but also retains water, and has excellent breathability. We believe the same can be said when nurturing the mind of young children. The first step is for the children to acquire basic lifestyle habits by building trust-based relationships with childcare providers and friends, by experiencing that preschool is a fun and safe place, and by placing value on outdoor play suitable for exploration. It is said that it takes more than 3,000 hours to learn the English language. At Pikkas, only English will be used during childcare hours. Because early childhood has the highest language acquisition ability, the children are introduced to a natural English environment, and when the children's range of interests expands, we naturally guide them to activities, such as reading and writing imbedded in play, according to each child's interests.
